OVERVIEW

Company Mission

Our company mission is to make it the norm for young men and women from developed countries to live and work as volunteers in a developing country; they should work on projects, which have a clearly favourable impact on host-communities. In this way, we will continue to create a multi-national community with a passion to serve and to inspire.

Care Programme Mission

Our Care programme mission is to provide sustainable educational support, care and protection to disadvantaged children and vulnerable groups to enhance their physical, social, emotional and cognitive development.

Background Information

52 million people live in poverty in Mexico and 12 million live in extreme poverty. There are many children working on the streets or have been abandoned since their families cannot care for them. Government efforts to address poverty are insufficient as the number of people living in poverty has surpassed its reach. Day care centres and orphanages struggle to cover all the costs so they are often understaffed and lack resources. Access to both education and healthcare are free in Mexico, however with the government's limited resources many educational centres benefit from additional support to try and give children the best chance possible to reach their potential.

Partners

Projects Abroad is registered as a non-governmental organisation (NGO) in Mexico. We collaborate with six different NGOs in Guadalajara and Ciudad Guzman. Some of our most important partners are the following organisations:

- Niños en Ambiente Familiar (NIA-FAM): an orphanage in Guadalajara that aims to reintroduce the concept of family living to those from broken or abusive homes
- Centro de Desarrollo Infantil (INFAL): a day care nursery in Ciudad Guzman
- Centro de Integracion Juvenil (U.T.R.): a centre caring for youngsters who have had problems with drugs or been living on the streets

GOALS

In order to work towards our Care programme mission, we have set the following goals to achieve in the placements where we send volunteers:

1. Improve English

Mexico's first commercial partner and neighbouring country is the United States. This, coupled with the booming tourism market, has meant that English is becoming increasingly important when finding a job. English is not taught in public primary schools and only in secondary school does it become mandatory. Our programme familiarises young children with the language by teaching English on a basic level so that by the time they reach secondary school they already have some exposure and will find it easier to learn.

2. Promote early childhood development

Early childhood is the period from birth to eight years of age. It is critical to a child's cognitive, social, emotional and physical development. Early education and preschool programmes enhance children's language and maths test scores, behavioural skills and long-term educational attainments.

Systematic measurement of early childhood development has multiple benefits. We aim to assess each child in fields of physical, social, emotional and cognitive development. Slow development can hinder a child's chance in primary school and lead to problems in later years. We are also looking for early signs of child abuse or neglect, learning difficulty or disability. Volunteers are able to recognise these needs and provide essential resources to support these children and their families.

3. Improve hygiene levels of the children

Many children who come to the institutions come from the streets or low standard housing and have poor levels of sanitation at home. This can lead to a host of diseases and infections. We educate and run activities to promote proper hygiene with the aim of improving overall health.

4. Improve the level of stimulation to each child

Children attending the day care centres are usually there because both their parents work full-time. Children have to spend longer hours at the centres and therefore require a lot of attention. Volunteers' activities encourage mental, physical and social stimulation. Early exposure to stimulating games and activities strengthens a child's memory capacity, learning ability, physical health, social skills and emotional coping skills.

5. Improve the quality of life for those living with disabilities

In Mexico, access to specialised disability care remains sparse. Those with disabilities can encounter many difficulties and have severely restricted opportunities in terms of employment and achieving a high quality of life. Volunteer's activities involve physical therapy, stimulating games and vocational training.
